Fasting is <u>laying</u> <u>aside</u> food, technology, media, relationships, entertainment, work, or anything else to seek to know God in a deeper experience. Fasting involves <u>prayer</u>, <u>worship</u>, <u>solitude</u>, <u>confession</u>, and <u>surrender</u>. As the Early Church desired to know the mind of God, they prayed and fasted.
